LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Alberta is the traditional and ancestral territory of many peoples, presently subject to Treaties 6, 7, and 8. Namely: The Blackfoot Confederacy – Kainai, Piikani, and Siksika – the Cree, Dene, Saulteaux, Nakota Sioux, Stoney Nakoda, and the Tsuu T'ina Nation and the Métis People of Alberta.

We believe in care. Through protection, advice, and genuine investment in our communities, we help Canadians feel secure, especially when it matters most.

MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO AND BOARD CHAIR

Twenty-five years ago, the Western Communities Foundation was built on a simple belief: caring for and protecting people does not stop at a policy. It is where our responsibility begins.

That belief continues to guide us today. As communities face new and evolving challenges, our role as a broker extends beyond responding to risk. It means showing up before, during and after communities need support.

In 2025, Western employees donated \$735,324 to more than 200 organizations across Canada, an increase from \$699,244 supporting approximately 160 organizations in 2024. We also donated over 1,800 volunteer hours, up 20% from 1,500 hours the year before. These numbers reflect thousands of individual decisions to step forward, support a neighbour and strengthen the communities we serve.

We also celebrated the 20th anniversary of our National Walk for Safe Places. Across the country, employees, customers, partners and community members came together with a shared goal: creating safer places to live, work and play. Some have walked with us for decades. Others joined for the first time. Each step is a reminder that safer communities are built through collective action.

We also saw how quickly communities can need support. When wildfires affected Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Atlantic Canada, the Foundation provided \$26,000 in emergency funding through the Canadian Red Cross to help families find stability in the days after losing their homes, and donated

\$2,500 toward meals for firefighters working on the front lines. Following the Lapu Lapu Day festival tragedy in Vancouver, we donated \$10,000 to the Crisis Centre of BC to support a community beginning to recover. In total, \$38,500 was donated to emergency causes, responding when communities needed support most.

Over the past 25 years, one lesson has stood out: trust is built through action. It is earned in the moments we celebrate together and especially when communities face unexpected challenges. Every donation, every hour volunteered and every act of support reflects that commitment.

To our employees, partners and the organizations we are proud to work alongside, thank you. Your commitment is what makes this work possible. Twenty-five years later, our purpose remains the same: caring for and protecting people when it matters most and being there for the communities that count on us.

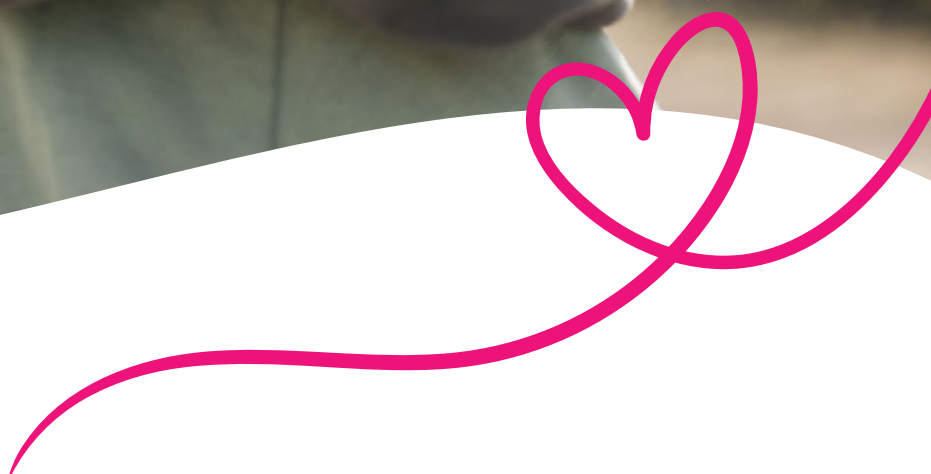

The Lethbridge team fired up the grill in the summer, let colleagues throw pies at each other and raised over \$470 through donations and sheer good fun.

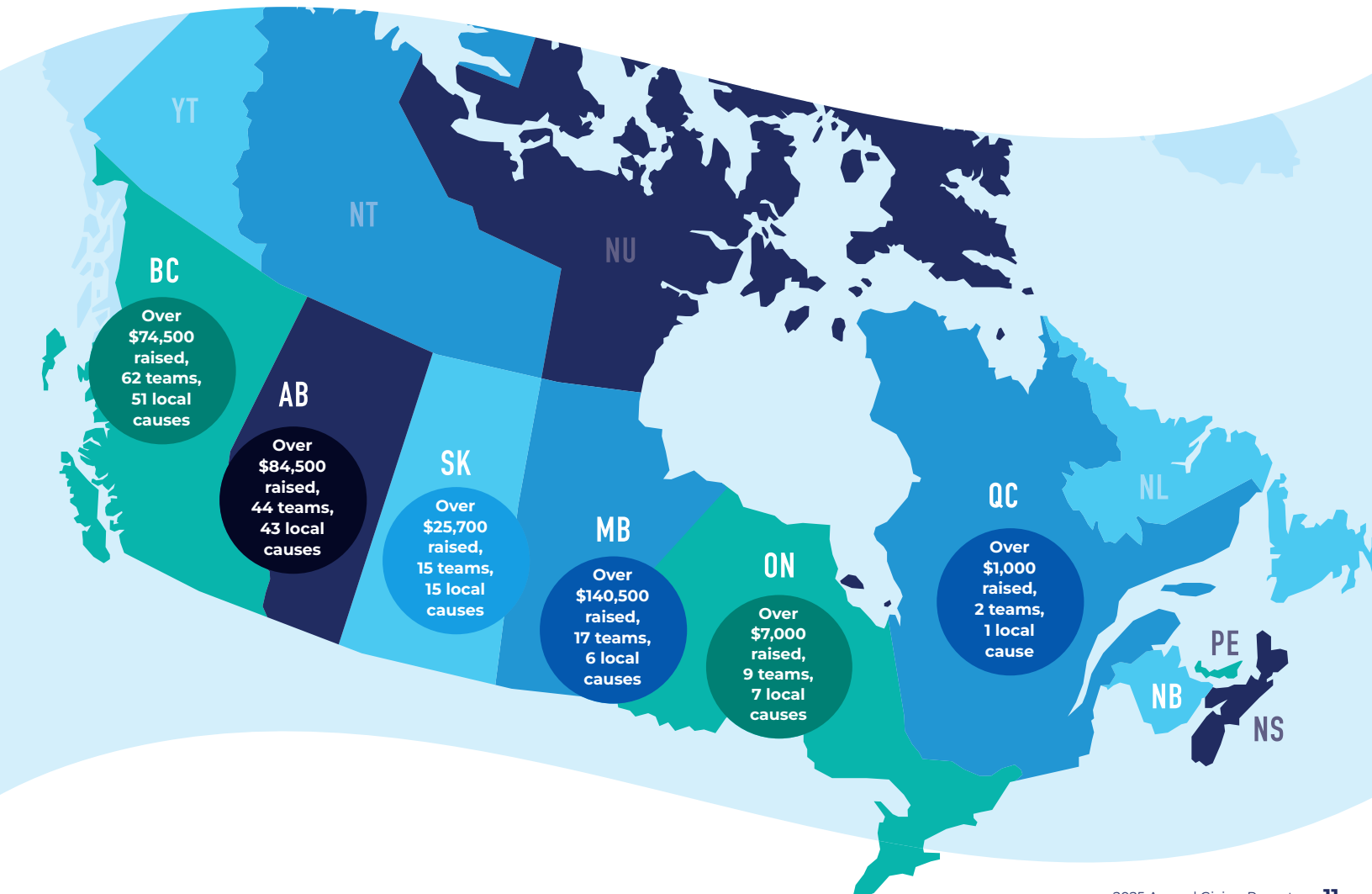

In 2025, the Western Communities Foundation invested \$48,000 through Indigenous Infrastructure Grants and Indigenous Inspirational Bursary Awards, supporting community-led projects and Indigenous students across Canada. From protecting sacred land and strengthening friendship centres to helping 24 graduating high school students take their next steps, each grant reflected needs identified by Indigenous communities themselves.

Since 2021, more than \$170,000 has been directed to Indigenous-focused initiatives and students, guided by our belief that reconciliation is not only about acknowledging the past, but also about supporting the people, places, and future leaders shaping what comes next.

Congratulations to our 2025 Indigenous Grant Recipients:

- **Tla-o-qui-aht First Nation**

- **Emergency Generator Replacement**

- This project will replace the emergency generator at Tin-Wis Resort, ensuring the Tla-o-qui-aht First Nation has a safe, self-sufficient hub for shelter, meals, and communication during disasters.

- **Tla'amin Nation**

- **Tla'amin Road Cemetery Improvements**

- This project will enhance one of Tla'amin Nation's most sacred sites by adding a gravel pathway, benches, and fencing repairs – supporting cultural continuity, accessibility, and respectful stewardship of over 200 unmarked graves identified through Ground Penetrating Radar survey.

- **Gitanmaax Band Council**

- **Gitanmaax's Playground Project**

- This project will replace unsafe equipment with inclusive, multi-age play spaces that promote physical activity, mental wellness, and community connection – advancing reconciliation and health equity in Northern Indigenous communities.

- **Island Métis Family & Community Services**

- **The Infinity Playground Renewal**

- This project will revitalize the Island Métis Childcare Centre's playground, creating a safe and inclusive space that nurtures healthy development and cultural identity for Métis children and families in Victoria.

- **Fraser Region Aboriginal Friendship Centre**

- **Sacred Spaces Project**

- This project will transform outdated office spaces into inclusive, culturally grounded environments that support healing, family reunification, and community connection for the urban Indigenous population. By upgrading infrastructure, it will expand program capacity and ensure a safe, welcoming space for Elders, families, youth, and survivors of trauma.

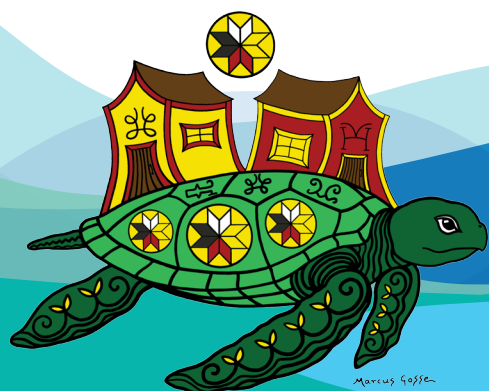
- **Ki-Low-Na Friendship Society**

- **KFS Centre Renovations**

- This project will renovate the KFS Center – an essential Indigenous community hub – by upgrading safety systems and communal spaces to create a more inclusive, accessible, and climate-resilient environment.

The Infinity Playground Renewal Project

Island Métis Family & Community Services Society



The Western Indigenous Infrastructure Grant is making it possible for the Island Métis Childcare Centre to resurface its playground and purchase new outdoor equipment, creating a safer, more engaging space for the children and families it serves.

For the Métis, First Nations, and Inuit children at the centre, outdoor play is about more than physical activity. It is where friendships form, confidence

grows, and a sense of belonging takes root. The renewed space will support land-based learning and shared experience, giving children a place where their identities are not just welcomed but reflected.

The Infinity Playground Renewal Project is a small investment with a long reach: healthy children, stronger families, and a community that knows it is seen.



This grant funding allowed us to completely revitalize our childcare centre's outdoor play space. Thanks to the grant, professional contractors were able to meticulously sand down all rough wooden surfaces, removing splinters and creating a smooth, safe environment. We are proud to offer a secure, beautiful and cultural outdoor learning environment. This project would not have been possible without Western's generous support, and for that the children, parents, and staff at our centre are deeply grateful.

In 2025, the Western Communities Foundation funded 37 infrastructure projects across Canada, helping communities strengthen the places and services people rely on every day. Through our Community Infrastructure Grant and Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) Infrastructure Grant streams, we supported everything from backup power and fire department well upgrades to inclusive playgrounds, hospice care, sensory-friendly childcare spaces, community hubs, and animal rehoming programs across the country.

Since 2004, the Foundation has invested more than \$2.7 million in 548 community projects nationwide, each one shaped by local needs and built to make everyday life safer, stronger, and more connected.

Early Years Centre Sensory Friendly Enhancements



Western Communities Foundation's Community Infrastructure Grant has made a meaningful difference for children and families accessing the Golden Early Years Centre (EYC). Thanks to this financial support, we have been able to improve sensory friendly experiences within EYC programs and play spaces, helping create a more welcoming, inclusive, and supportive environment for children in our community.

Families visiting the Golden EYC include children with diverse sensory and developmental needs. With this funding, we have been able to purchase sensory resources, calming materials, and create quieter, calmer, and more accessible spaces where children can feel safe, regulated, and successful in their play and learning experiences.

One parent recently shared that, for the first time, their child felt comfortable staying and participating during a group program because the environment better supported their sensory needs. Experiences like this reduce isolation for families and help caregivers feel accepted, connected, and supported within the community.

The impact of Western's grant extends beyond individual children. By improving accessibility and inclusion at the Golden Early Years Centre, the Western Communities Foundation is helping build a stronger community where all families feel they belong and can participate fully in early years programming.

Through our Inspirational Bursary Awards, we supported 112 graduating students as they prepared for life after high school, whether that meant university, college, trades, apprenticeships or career training. Behind each bursary is a young person with a story of courage and momentum: a student pursuing medicine after supporting their family through hardship, or heading into the trades after finding confidence, purpose and belonging through hands-on learning.

These awards are more than financial support. They are a reminder to students that their hard work has been seen, their resilience matters, and their future is worth investing in. By helping young people take that next step, Western is committed to supporting the next generation of leaders, caregivers, builders, teachers and community changemakers.



Featured Bursary Story Alexis Oishi

With both parents working in healthcare, and through her own experience with hearing loss and cochlear implants, Alexis spent much of her life understanding the medical world not as something distant, but as something deeply personal.

That experience has shaped where she is headed next. Alexis plans to study nursing at Vancouver Island University, where she hopes to build the skills to care for others with the same compassion and understanding that have guided her own journey. Her resilience, academic drive and commitment to helping people reflect the heart of the Inspirational Bursary Award program: supporting young people as they turn lived experience into purpose.
